

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

SSA BRITTANY MITCHELL MAKES A DIFFERENCE

There is power and hope wrapped in believing in someone’s abilities. Tony Fisher, service recipient at the Scioto County Board of Developmental Disabilities (SCDD) knows first hand the difference this belief can make in a person’s life. “Brittany is my SSA and she never gives up on me,” Fisher remarked. Brittany Mitchell, Service and Support Administrator (SSA) at SCDD has been Tony’s service coordinator going on 5 years. Ensuring that the right supports are in place to help Tony, and other service recipients, succeed is a key aspect of the SSA role. When Tony hit obstacles in a previous job, Brittany was right there advocating for Tony during his weekly meetings. Through assessment, determination, and belief in Tony’s abilities, Brittany did not give up hope on him. Brittany learned of a new program out of Pike County called ACES that helps build employment skills. She called upon them to provide services to Tony to help sharpen his skills in order for him to achieve employment success. “It is important that you continue to support people with their dreams, while breaking down any barriers they face in order to help them achieve their goals,” explained Brittany. “SSAs have a wonderful opportunity to help connect people with the services they need to help them live a self determined, good life,” She continued, “seeing things come together for people helps me appreciate the small things and gives a sense of satisfaction that I’ve ever had with any other job.”

SSAs conduct person centered planning and assessments on a daily basis to help people achieve the outcomes they want out of life. They utilize information gained in the planning process to connect people on their caseloads with services and then author the service and supports into their Individualized Service Plans (ISPs). Candidates for SSA positions must have a minimum of a Bachelor’s Degree in human services or other applicable field. There are currently SSA positions available. To apply, send resume and applications to the Fiscal and Human Resources office of the Scioto County Board of Developmental Disabilities.

The Scioto County Probate Judge, Alan Lemons appointed Adrienne Buckler Callihan to serve on the Scioto County Board of Developmental Disabilities, beginning in 2022, at a small ceremony at the court house in November 2021. Callihan was appointed to replace 12 year board member, Jeff Kleha, who completed his tenure last month.

On January 27, 2022, Adrienne participated in her first board meeting. She was also appointed as chair of the ethics committee. Adrienne shared that her own educational journey began at the Carousel Center, as she was a preschooler in their very first class that included “typically developing” students integrated with students with developmental delays and other disabilities. Adrienne reflected, “Looking back, I had no idea how big of an impact that preschool classroom would have on my life. Being involved in the DD community is now something that is not just “typical” to me, it is important, a staple. From the Special Olympics or Hardwood Heroes, to the Vocation Station or Halloween carnivals, to simply still having friends like Daniel or Neil, the DD community is truly in my heart! Then AND now.”

Coming full circle from being a student in the classroom to having the opportunity to be involved as member of the board, Adrienne expressed, “It is truly an honor to give back to people who mean so much to me. And, while I feel like I never really left the DD community, or really, that preschool classroom, I’m so glad to (officially) be back!”


Michael Arnett and Cindy Gibson were sworn in by Scioto County Commissioner, Scottie Powell for a 2nd term on the board.

The Human Rights Committee is tasked with ensuring individuals, living with a developmental disability, are receiving the least restrictive supports needed to ensure their health, safety, and welfare. HRC is a volunteer position. The members are appointed annually by the Superintendent. The group receives training, approved by DODD, to carry out their duties and is made up of an equal representation of people who meet the following criteria: a person eligible to receive DD services; a family member of someone eligible to receive DD services; a qualified person with experience or training in contemporary measures of behavioral support; and a county board staff or service provider.

UPDATED COVID-19 PROTOCOLS


Highlights from 1/6/2022 Memo by Superintendent Matthew Purcell

In accordance with changes from the Ohio Department of Health and the Centers for Disease Control:

- Diagnosed with COVID-19:
 - Stay home & isolate for a minimum of 5 days regardless of symptoms or the lack of them.
 - wear a three-layer (or better) mask when you are positive and must be around other people.
- Exposed to COVID-19 & Vaccinated (up to date on shots/booster)
 - Not required to quarantine unless you develop symptoms or test positive.
 - Wear a mask for 10 days after exposure
 - take a COVID test on day five.
- Exposed to COVID-19 & Not Vaccinated (or vaccines are not up-to-date)
 - Stay home and wear a mask around other people for a minimum of 5 days after exposure.
 - Take a COVID test on day five and isolate at home if you develop symptoms or test results are positive.

Things that are not changing:

- Masks required in all buildings. This does not apply to students who do not tolerate masks.
- Masks do not have to be worn when someone is working alone in an enclosed workspace or when actively eating and drinking.
- Masks should cover both the mouth and the nose.
- While in our buildings or working in the field, all employees must have immediate access to a mask in case they find themselves in an unexpected, congregate situation.
- All sanitization procedures will continue.
- Social distancing is encouraged whenever possible.
- Being vaccinated and receiving the booster are highly recommended.
- We will maintain separate entrances, continue taking temperatures upon entering our buildings, and reporting elevated temperatures to the FMX system.
- Staff members who must isolate or quarantine and those with positive tests are required to report to school nurse Loretta Cooper as soon as they are able so that she may make timely reports to the local health department. Mrs. Cooper may be reached by email (lcooper@sciotodd.org) and voice mail (740-353-1876, ask for the nurse's office, Ext. 34130). See memo emailed to staff on 1/6 for further details regarding specific information to report.

Steve has been an employee of SCDD for over 16 years serving in a variety of roles throughout the organization, including: substitute teacher, Service and Support Administrator, Community Employment Team Leader, and Medicaid Services Manager. Over the past five years, Steve concentrated his focus on more of the fiscal aspect of service rendering. "During that time, Steve was responsible for monitoring all Medicaid services, providing quality assurance on billable services, and assisting administration with program development to maximize efficiency of our revenues.", according to Matt Purcell, Superintendent of SCDD.
