Certain equipment can be costlier than average sports equipment due to the need for adaptive devices to play the sport for those with special needs. Adaptive equipment such as specialized wheelchairs for basketball can range anywhere from \$2,000 to \$5,000 for one chair. Scioto County Special Olympics wants to ensure that there are no barriers for people with disabilities to participate in the activities they love," said Hoffer. "It was so rewarding. I bonded with parents and caregivers immediately because I knew what they were going through. It was immediately fulfilling and I love coming to work every day," she said.

By the time Wallace announced she would be leaving the program, Metzler had worked her way up to Lead Developmental Specialist and was already doing some of the leadership duties in the department. That experience helped make her the best choice for director.

"I'm still learning and there are big shoes to fill. Erica was an amazing director, and before that Tammy Nelson was our director and she was with this program from the time it was born. So I feel like I've had great guidance and mentorship. The administrative staff and all of the county board departments have been fantastic to answer questions and make me feel welcome," she said. SSA Kristi Cyrus has been hired as SCDD's first Provider Liaison



The Scioto County Board of Developmental Disabilities (SCDD) has created a new position to assist local providers and better serve the community. Providers, referred to as direct support professionals, are private agencies or individuals who are certified to provide a variety of services such as in-home caregiving or transportation to people with developmental disabilities (DD). Kristi Cyrus, who currently works for SCDD, will be transitioning from her current role as a Service and Support Administrator (SSA) to her new position as the county's first Provider Liaison.

Cyrus began her career as an independent provider and worked one on one, for 10 years, with a person who received county board services. Afterward, she returned to college and earned a degree in social work and interned at the Clinton County Board of Developmental Disabilities until she was offered a full-time SSA job. She later moved to Scioto

County and started working as an SSA Assistant for SCDD in 2016, and quickly transitioned to SSA in 2017.

In September 2023, Cyrus will begin her new job as Provider Liaison. While many county boards across Ohio already have provider liaisons working within DD, this is a newly-created position for Scioto County. For several years supporting providers has been a focus at SCDD, with many responsibilities carried out by several different staff members. However, the progression of reallocating duties after a previous retirement brought a pathway for the creation of this role making it possible to have a dedicated person to concentrate solely on provider support needs.

"I have loved working both as a provider and an SSA. I think it has made me a better person. It has taught me patience and responsibility, and I love it so much. The reason I took on the Provider Liaison role is because

I want to help support providers to be able to deliver the best services to individuals with developmental disabilities in our community, and I want to help recruit new providers," Cyrus said. Jessica Hoffer, director of outreach at SCDD explained, "The field of DD has faced provider shortages over the past decade. People with developmental disabilities and their families rely on providers and the important work they do to ensure their care and wellbeing. Without enough of the right people in direct support professionals roles, the

health and safety of individuals with developmental disabilities are at risk."

Among her new responsibilities, Cyrus will be supporting providers throughout the process of becoming providers, understanding their requirements, and connecting them to more training opportunities.

"This position is greatly needed, and I'm excited about working with other counties to see how they've built the job around provider support. We're just learning how to have this position and what it's going to look like, and I want to be in the best position to help the providers of Scioto County have the tools they need to do a great job," Cyrus said.

SCDD VRS teacher's assistant earns national intervener certification



Scioto County Developmental Disabilities Tracy Smith, teacher's assistant at Vern Riffe School was among those recognized during a special banquet held in Columbus on Sept. 22, 2023, for those who have completed national intervener certification. Smith is the first person from Ohio ever to earn this certification.

An intervener is a support role in which certified interveners work directly one-on-one with students with sensory impairment, such as deaf or blind, to help them achieve their goals. The certificate program is a two-year online

program offered by Shawnee State University, in Portsmouth, Ohio. Smith has been a teacher's assistant with SCDD since 2012, first working at the Carousel Center before moving to the Vern Riffe School in 2016.

"I've always had a fascination with sign language because I had several kids at the Carousel

Center who spoke primarily in sign language, and so many nonverbal kids with autism that sign language kind of became a second nature to me after a while. But I've never had a good background in braille, which is another thing that has fascinated me. So when this program became available I jumped at the chance," she said. She completed the intervener program this year, and submitted her portfolio and work to be reviewed by the national certification board in Utah. Having been approved by the board,

she was invited to receive her certificate during a special honors banquet hosted by the Ohio Dean's Compact Conference in Columbus. "It was all about our children with special needs in all different parts of the country coming together to talk about their programs and procedures. My area is called lowincidence because there's not a lot of deaf-blind people out there. At the conference, they all come together to talk about what they are doing and brainstorm different things that can be done for our community," she said. She confessed it was overwhelming being in front of so many people, but felt comfortable

"I got a lot of congratulations when they found out I was the first from Ohio to get this certification," she said. "I enjoyed it and I'm glad I stepped out of my comfort-zone and I did it. I think I found my niche because I really like doing this kind of work."
