SCDD hosts Red Cross blood drive for VRS graduate

The first blood drive ever held at Vern Riffe School was Jan. 10, in honor of Jon Adkins

Scioto County Developmental Disabilities and the American Red Cross hosted a blood drive in the gymnasium of the SCDD's Vern Riffe School (VRS) in Portsmouth on Wednesday, January 10, 2024. This was the first blood drive ever hosted at the school, and it was in honor of a recent VRS graduate, Jon Adkins.

Jon, a 2023 graduate of VRS, has a positive, energetic, hard working attitude. He loves to play pranks and jokes. On New Year's Eve 2022, Jon got sick. He was subsequently diagnosed with stage 3 testicular cancer. Since his diagnosis, Jon has endured chemotherapy, multiple blood transfusions, major surgery, and is currently undergoing kidney dialysis. But through it all, that positive personality continues to be evident.

Andrea McClellan, a VRS Positive Support Facilitator, spearheaded this event. "Jon has had to receive maybe 11 or 12 units of blood since his diagnosis. We thought this would be something that we, as a community, could do to support him and his family. We just thought: everybody can't give money, but everybody does have blood."

Andrea requested 20 donor spots



and she was assigned 43 by the Red Cross. At the end of this very successful day, a total of 34 pints of blood were donated! And Jon even stopped by to say hello to his many friends gathered at the Vern Riffe School.

Many volunteers and friends of Jon also stepped in to help make sure the event was successful. "Some of Jon's former classmates, who are still attending school here (VRS), are volunteering and helping out. An individual from Minford High School and three of his friends also came to help. Some of the older students are making cookies today to serve in the canteen," McClellan said. Developmental specialists work with referred infants and toddlers along with their families. They connect families with therapies, various services and assist with developing and implementing an individualized family services plan. "In college I got a job working with adults with disabilities and I fell in love with the individuals, so I changed my degree in college to continue to work in the DD field," Culver said. "Working at Scioto DD has been absolutely amazing. We have the most collaborative team serving young children, and we get to be the difference in tomorrow's future leaders."

In her new role as Lead Developmental Specialist, Culver will continue working with individuals one-on-one, but will have the added leadership responsibility of helping train and mentor the DD's staff of developmental specialists.

Catie Metzler, Director of Early Childhood Programs said Culver was an easy choice for the job. "She's great at helping support the staff, but an added strength is that when she's presented with a problem, she is really good about coming up with positive solutions," she said. "Erica is a phenomenal mother and you can see that in her compassion for the youth and caregivers she works with." As Culver prepares for this new job, she said she is looking forward to helping mentor new staff. "I want to be open-minded and help people feel comfortable coming to me," Culver said. Cindy Newman of STAR, Inc. named statewide 'Nurse of the Year'

Presented with award during annual conference in Columbus



STAR, Inc. Nurse, Cindy Newman, received the prestigious Nurse of the Year award during the Ohio Provider Resource Association (OPRA) conference in Columbus on Oct. 26, 2023.

"Every year they put on their annual conference, and they invite their members to submit for awards and I submitted for Cindy as Nurse of the Year. She has 34 years serving the DD population in Scioto County and she's set to retire in 2024. I thought this

was an apt time to recognize her many vears of excellent service," said STAR, Inc. Director of Operations Kelly Hunter. Hunter said Newman has been an excellent nurse who has always promoted STAR. Inc.'s commitment to health and safety. "In the eight or nine state reviews that we've had since I've been with the DD, which is 23 years, we've never gotten a citation regarding health and safety. In all that time, Cindy has made sure the citizens of Scioto

County health and safety has been a priority," she said.

Newman was selected from a pool of 15 nominees as OPRA Nurse of the Year, and attended the conference in Columbus joined by Scioto County Developmental Disabilities Provider Liaison Kristi Cyrus.

"Cindy works for STAR, Inc., one of the great provider agencies in our county serving people with developmental disabilities and we wanted to show our support for

her achievement and recognition," Cvrus said. "As I've worked with her through the years, she has been very helpful and she has always answered my questions. She's just an amazing person and very deserving of this award." STAR, Inc. is a non-profit organization in Portsmouth, Ohio, dedicated to enriching the lives of adults with developmental disabilities by promoting independence, providing choices, giving support, empowering lives, and offering guidance. SCDD January 2024 Organizational Meeting and Regular Meeting

The Scioto County Board of **Developmental Disablities** conducted its annual organizational meeting in January 2024, followed by its regular monthly meeting. During the organizational meeting, the board elected as its officers President Michael Arnett, Vice-President Anthony Mantell, and Recording Secretary Cindy Gibson, as well as standing committee appointments: Finance/ Personnel – Chairperson Anthony Mantell and member Jon Peters: Ethics Council – Chairperson Adrienne Buckler-Callihan and member Cindy Gibson; Facilities - Chairperson William Adams and members Anthony Mantell and Ellen Murray. During its regular monthly meeting, Superintendent Matt Purcell delivered his report to the Board during which he commended the Leadership team for their exemplary efforts in maximizing non-traditional funding sources, bringing in roughly \$730,000 in

grant money to the organization at no cost to taxpayers or other operational funds.

The board also heard a legislative update, regarding a bill which is in process to establish a registry for people with DD in the community which will be available to 911 emergency/first responder personnel.

During new business, the board took the following actions:

- Approved motion to maintain current services provided by SOCOG in 2024, including advocacy, SSA Assistants, and MUI investigations.
- Approved motion of a mandatory resolution which states the intent of the County Board to honor payment of a share of non-federal Medicaid for qualified individuals.
 Approval of this Resolution complies with Ohio Revised Code Sections 5126.059 and 5126.0510 which mandate County Boards pay the Non-

Federal share of Medicaid expenditures for certain services to eligible individuals.

- Approved motion to accept the annual budget
- Approved motion on allocation of IDEA Part B Funds (Federal Awards). Purcell explained that through IDEA (Individual's with Disabilities Education Act) Part B, funds are awarded to school districts to assist with education costs provided to students with disabilities. The recommended use of the awarded funding (approximately \$17,000) is to put towards teacher's salaries to offset costs.
- Approved motion to accept revised Policy 1.08 - Meetings of the Board and Transaction of Business. Purcell stated this Policy had been updated to include the language regarding remote attendance for Board and Committee meetings. The rest of the policy remains unchanged.




STEFANY McGLONE

Kierra lives in Wheelersburg. She enjoys spending time with her grandmother and cat, Ollie. She also enjoys painting, hiking, and anything musical.






TAMMY GRIGSON
