A LETTER FROM

THE SUPERINTENDENT

More choices on the horizon for individuals served by SCBDD

Thank you for taking the time to read our 2015 Annual Report to the Community. It is an exciting time to be in the field of developmental disabilities. Our system is changing in a way that is unprecedented with driving forces based on inclusion and choice.

The last state of Ohio biennial budget contained a historical amount of funding aimed at reducing the number of individuals being served in institutional settings, while the federal Centers for Medicaid Services has mandated that County Boards can no longer provide services funded by Medicaid waivers. To comply with this mandate, the SCBDD passed a Resolution to discontinue providing these services on or before July 1, 2018.

Specifically, this means that the Adult Services program operated by STAR, Inc., will be a fully private provider of services.

However, this does not mean services to individuals will be reduced, but rather expanded through more options for services. Since Medicaid waivers fund the majority of services our individuals receive, our role as the Local Administrative Medicaid Authority will continue to increase. Our obligation to provide the 40 percent non-federal share cost of each waiver will continue to be a major component of where our finances go. In 2015 there were 237 individuals receiving one of the various waivers and this number will only increase.

Another factor that must be considered when planning for the future is acknowledging choice and inclusion can only be realized with a wide variety of qualified providers of service. This means more recruiting efforts will be needed on the part of SCBDD, as well as provider support resources.

It is easy to see how SCBDD's role in administering Medicaid waivers and all that entails — such as authorizing and reauthorizing waiver services, providing quality control, assisting with provider selection, and ongoing service coordination and monitoring — is becoming an ever-increasing part of what we do. So, whether an individual lives in a licensed group home, receives assistance in their home through a provider, or participates in Adult Day services, all of these services are paid for by waiver dollars, and at the hub of this is the local County Board. The statutory duties of the County Board remain the same, regardless of who provides the services.


While we are proud of our hallmark programs such as Vern Riffe School and Adult Day Services that have been provided at STAR, our hope is the many functions of the County Board are captured to give more insight into what we do and where we are going. In all we do, however, the ultimate goal of the SCBDD is to work together to build meaningful lives.





SCBDD's MUI office investigates allegations of abuse, neglect, misappropriation

Our Major Unusual Incident (MUI) office, part of the Service and Support Administration Department, is located in Vern Riffe School.


A major unusual incident is any incident that may have impact an individual's health and safety.

Under the Ohio Revised Code, County Boards are responsible for investigating any allegation of abuse, neglect, or misappropriation. While other agencies have a statutory duty to take the lead in certain cases — such as Children's Services when the individual is a minor, law enforcement when a crime is involved, or Adult Protective Services for those 60 and older — the County Board is required to complete an investigation.

On average, more than 120 MUI investigations are completed each year, and all with the purpose of preventing re-occurrences.







Eligibility determined through assessment by the Intake Department

Only County Boards of Developmental Disabilities can determine eligibility for services through a standardized assessment developed by the Ohio Department of DD.

Our Intake and Referral Department, located in the Carousel Center, completed 102 eligibility determinations in 2015. That's down from 117 determinations in 2014 and up from the 96 performed in 2013.

Due to current trends statewide, the Intake Department expects continued growth as far as the performance of eligibility determinations and number of people served.

It's a high-octane sport in which Ray, who loves the game and whose dream was to work with the Bears, excels in his own ways.



Early Childhood refines approach to serving families

Early Childhood Services is taking a more individualized approach than it ever has; it's a strategy aimed at supporting community needs that have exploded with growth.

While the Carousel Preschool program closed at the end of the 2015-2016 school year due to a decline in referrals and increased availability of services in home school districts, more children will be served through Early Intervention efforts at Carousel. This means eligible Scioto County children birth through 6 years of age can be served in their homes, expanding the program to serve more of our community's children outside of the school setting.

Staff utilize the PLAY approach, which is a home-based program especially geared toward children with autism spectrum

disorders, or ASD. Goals are set by families and staff, and long-term plans are created to help families meet those goals. Some may include such things as developing increased communication skills, toilet training, and stronger relationships within the family. Carousel has already seen success with the PLAY project. It was utilized on a smaller level in previous years.

An additional developmental specialist position was created to help address the needs of children being served by the program. Specialists go to the children, as opposed to the children being brought to a central location. There may be opportunities for educational experiences outside of the home, as well, such as trips to local businesses to learn about appropriate behaviors and interactions.

Our Early Childhood services have been revamped to provide more intensive intervention services to more children. We now serve children from birth up through the age of 6 in their homes.

In 2015, 114 children were served through this program, and the department continues to see a significant increase of children identified as having a delay due to drug addiction.

We are passionate about this program because research backs up that the early intervention services provided to children identified as having a delay can produce more positive outcomes than at any other time.

SCBDD staff in Early Childhood services became certified in the PLAY method in 2015, and the results have been overwhelmingly positive.
