From the Directors

SSA department an umbrella involving several services for individuals served by SCBDD

With my first contribution to the directors' corner section of the SCBDD newsletter I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce myself and our department to readers who may have

little or no knowledge of the Service and Support Administration Department and our function.

My name is Chad Phipps and I serve as the director of our department. I have been full-time in this role since January 1 following the retirement of long-time director Donna Royse. I have been a part of the

SCBDD for 15 years, initially as a Primary Service Coordinator (what would now be called a SSA), then as Behavioral Supports Coordinator, and previous to this position as part of the administrative team of STAR Adult Day Services. Prior to my experiences with the Board as my employer, I was a Supported Living provider working directly with individuals we serve in their homes and communities. I look forward to advancing our mission of "Together, we build meaningful lives."

Our department serves many roles within our organization including; Service coordination provided by Service

and Support Administrators (SSA), Behavior Supports (Ages 6 and up), MUI/UI Investigations, 24-hour on-call service, PAWS and billing supports, along with many other functions that

fall under our umbrella.

An SSA serves as the main point of coordination for an individual and as the contact for the services that they are assessed to need. In order to receive SSA services the individual must be 3 years or older, eligible for SCBDD services and they or their legal guardian must request the service. Our Intake department phone

number for eligibility determinations is (740)353-8448. If eligibility has already been determined, the Intake department is also the number you (as the individual served or their legal guardian) would contact to request the SSA service.

An SSA can assess and coordinate services to meet your needs, locate community resources, serve as local Medicaid authority, develop service plans called ISPs, and monitor and ensure efficiency and efficacy of services.


SCBDD's 2015 Annual Report now available
